This companion study guide is aimed at helping individuals and those participating in a small group Bible study setting to engage with the book and apply its truths to their lives.

For each chapter in the book, the study guide comprises the following elements:

- A brief description and of the teaching contained in the chapter.
- 15 bullet point statements.
- 15 Bible verses for memorization which correspond to that chapter's teaching.
- 10 practical applications of this teaching.
- 15 questions for personal reflection and group discussion.
- Five recommended books and resources that can help the reader further engage with the subject.

HOW TO USE THIS STUDY GUIDE

The study guide is designed to work both for an individual or members of a Bible study group or small group working through this material.

Ideally, we encourage you to read through the main book and, at the end of every chapter, then work through the study guide. It can be a good idea to use a pen or pencil to underline things that speak to you. We encourage you to read through this material with a journal or blank paper at hand. Write down the things that God is saying to you.

An important component in this book is the two chapters concerning constructing a vision for your personal relationship and work with God. You will get out of this material what you put into it. We invite you to approach this prayerfully, filled with hope for everything God has for you.

I encourage you to take the time to think through the questions that correspond to each chapter. There is not always a correct answer to these questions; the goal is not to tick a box, but to reflect, meditate, and allow the Lord to provoke things within your own heart.

When reading through the applications, it could be good to ask yourself: How can I do this? When can I do this? What would it look like to embed this application into my life? How do I struggle with this?

Most of all, enjoy the journey and learn to drink from the Rock who is Christ Jesus (1 Corinthians 10:4).

NOTES FOR SMALL GROUP LEADERS

This material is designed to help both individuals and small group Bible studies engage with the content. Here are practical guidelines to help you lead a small group and maximize the benefits of this study guide.

When leading a group, it is beneficial to encourage everyone to commit for a specific time period. The study guide is ideally designed to cover a three-month period with weekly meetings. I encourage you to ask every participant to make a strong commitment to attend for the entire three-month period. Participants will connect more deeply with the material if they engage with it consistently each week. They will also form stronger connections with other group members, fostering relationships and embarking on a shared journey through this material.

Setting expectations is crucial when leading a small group. I recommend that small groups meet for an hour, with the option to extend if the group's energy and dynamism warrant it.

There are various ways to use this material, and I encourage leaders to follow this format:

- Prepare 3-4 short teaching segments, each lasting 5 to 7 minutes.
- Lead 3-4 discussion sessions where everyone has the opportunity to share a thought, answer a question, or ask a question.

I encourage leaders to use a clock or timer to manage teaching segments, as it is easy to lose track of time and overrun.

When facilitating discussions, setting expectations is important, as many participants may not be accustomed to time limits on their contributions. Depending on group size, ask each person to share a thought within 30 to 40 seconds and then pass the baton to the next participant. If you set expectations at the beginning, it will be easier to keep participants within those limits. Forgetting to do so can lead to frustration when you try to rein them in mid-speech.

* * *

Leaders should actively steward and curate discussions. Simply asking people to share and then sitting back is ineffective. Instead, guide the conversation, ask supplementary questions, and engage with participants. It is beneficial to lovingly challenge participants' assertions, encouraging critical thinking rather than mere regurgitation of answers.

Ideally, the leader's role is to guide the discussion so that the group collectively delves deeper into the truth of God's word. There may be times when the leader needs to correct a participant who makes a completely false or unbiblical statement. However, the ideal approach is to challenge participants to think biblically and help them gain a higher perspective.

Leaders should clearly communicate which chapter will be covered in the following week's session and ensure all participants have access to the study notes for preparation.

Concluding the small group study with a time of prayer or ministry is beneficial, as it allows us to collectively commit to our relationship and inheritance in Christ Jesus.

CHAPTER 1 - THE PROMISE OF LIFE IN CHRIST

In chapter one, we explore the truth that believers are called into a relationship with God through Christ, not as something to be built by personal effort, but as an inheritance received by faith. We uncover that while many Christians understand how to begin this relationship—through repentance and faith in Jesus—they often lack guidance on maintaining and flourishing in it, leading to frustration. God invites us into a face-to-face fellowship with Him, desiring that we find complete satisfaction in Him alone. Many believers fail to experience this, measuring themselves against others rather than God's standard in Christ Jesus.

Chapter one teaches that our relationship with God is not a product of self-effort, which leads to religion and inevitable failure, but an inheritance secured through Christ's work on the cross. Sin separates us from God, producing shame that drives us to hide, yet we are declared righteous in Christ, enabling us to live in His presence. The parable of the prodigal son illustrates this inheritance: The elder brother is always with the Father, and all He has is his, yet many live as servants rather than sons due to a misunderstanding of their standing.

The chapter challenges the notion that a vibrant relationship with God is reserved for eternity, asserting that eternal life and fellowship with Him are available now. It critiques the tendency to accept a low-level connection with God, urging believers to reject self-reliant efforts and embrace the pre-existing relationship they have in Christ. This relationship, marked by constant presence and access to all God has, requires faith and intentional acknowledgment rather than performance. The chapter sets the stage for a journey of discovery, promising practical steps to explore and enjoy this inheritance in daily life, reorienting our existence around unbroken fellowship with God.

CHAPTER 2 - THE RELATIONAL KINGDOM

The chapter "The Relational Kingdom" explores the kingdom of God as a present, relational reality, rather than solely a future hope. It clarifies that the kingdom is where God reigns, fully established in heaven and partially on earth through believers who submit to Jesus' lordship. Jesus proclaimed this kingdom's arrival through His teachings and miracles, demonstrating its availability now. The kingdom exists in contrast to the worldly kingdom, with believers as citizens of heaven living under God's rule, provision, and healing amidst a world influenced by the god of this age.

The chapter emphasizes that the kingdom's essence is relational, centered on a personal, experiential relationship with Jesus Christ rather than mere intellectual knowledge or ministry achievements. While ministry and miracles are valuable, they are not the ultimate goal; instead, true fulfillment comes from knowing Jesus intimately. The Bible serves not just as information but as an invitation to this relationship, with Scripture being God-breathed and alive with the Spirit's power. The kingdom grows like yeast, expanding its influence on earth, a process underway since Christ's arrival.

The chapter highlights the need to move beyond theoretical faith to a lived experience, where ministry flows naturally from intimacy with God. Examples from the early church illustrate that effective ministry arises from worship and relationship rather than performance. The chapter critiques reducing the kingdom to facts, asserting that truth is embodied in Jesus, the way, truth, and life. Daily communion with Him transforms knowledge into a vibrant, heart-centered faith, satisfying the soul's deepest longings through His love.

CHAPTER 3 - THE RELATIONSHIP OF JESUS WITH HIS FATHER

This chapter explores the transformative truth that God does not call believers to forge an individual relationship with Him but invites them into the eternal, pre-existing relationship between Jesus and the Father. This invitation hinges on the concept of being "in Christ," a recurring theme in the New Testament, particularly in Paul's epistles. Understanding this phrase reveals that believers inherit a perfect and complete relationship with God, shifting them from striving for acceptance to living out a received grace. This shift fosters rest and peace, as the focus moves from earning God's favor to working out the salvation already given.

The chapter underscores the necessity of humility in this journey. Believers are urged to honestly assess their current walk with God, recognizing where it falls short of the divine standard. This humility enables them to reject distorted imitations of faith—often shaped by human examples or traditions—and pursue the authentic relationship modeled by Jesus. The only true benchmark for this relationship is Jesus's own communion with the Father, characterized by unbroken unity and fellowship throughout eternity, including His earthly life.

Jesus's relationship with the Father was effortless and natural, free from separation or religious striving. As both fully God and fully man, He lived dependent on the Holy Spirit, demonstrating what is possible for every believer. His sinless life flowed from abiding in the Father's love, not from personal effort, offering a pattern for believers to follow. This communion was marked by constant dialogue with the Father, a joy in His presence, and a boldness rooted in righteousness, untainted by shame or doubt.

The chapter challenges common misconceptions that distance believers from this reality, such as viewing Jesus solely as divine and thus unrelatable. Instead, it emphasizes His humanity, showing that His life of fellowship is accessible through the Spirit. Believers are called to abide in Christ, allowing His life to flow through them, overcoming sin and worldly distractions by resting in their identity in Him. This

relationship, inherited through Christ, positions believers in heavenly places, enabling them to experience the same intimacy, victory, and joy Jesus knew with the Father.
